## Examples of RACSRAG supported projects

### Kalimpong Project (Phase 1) EastBengal, India

Construction of a Vocational Training Workshop with the help of a Global Grant to benefit the survivors of human trafficking and the local community. In addition to the RF grant, funds have been provided by 13 Rotary Clubs in Scotland, England and the Czech Republic, 3 Rotary Districts and 4 individual contributions.



Phase 2 will involve the construction of an accommodation block above the the VT Workshop for the survivors of slavery.

**School4Freedom** – Freeing a village from debt bondage in India

\$36,000 has been collected from clubs in the USA, UK and Australia to sustain a three year Project whose main aim is to free an entire village in Uttar Pradesh, India from generational debt bondage.



#### Maiti Nepal - A Trafficking Shelter in Nepal

Several earthquakes in Nepal in 2015 resulted in considerable damage to the buildings operated by Maiti Nepal, a Shelter in Kathmandu, recently visited by several RACSRAG members just before the earthquakes. Consequently the Action Group and its members are committed to helping with the required renovations over the next few years.

In Africa, children languish as slaves in cocoa fields. In India, they suffer in carpet, clothing and firework factories, and in debt bondage on tea plantations, stone quarries and brick kilns. In Haiti, they are abused in forced domestic servitude whilst in the Middle East they are strapped to camels and compelled to work as jockeys.

Across the globe, young girls & boys - sold for sex & labour - are the second most lucrative commodity for organised crime after drugs. Unlike drugs, children can be sold for use today (oftenseveral times) and sold again tomorrow.
