Whether you are new to the issue, or deeply immersed, you will find tools and techniques to help you combat trafficking locally – and globally. We have found that many Rotarians and Rotary Clubs start with a local CAPE project, gathering together community stakeholders to assess the needs in their community and from their determine how to best proceed. You will find tools to help you identify key stakeholders, and how to facilitate stakeholder meetings to get you started. Additionally, you will find **prevention education curriculum criteria and a list vetted providers** if your club would rather not start from scratch.

Some Rotarians and Clubs may choose to focus on or support projects in areas with the highest concentrations of trafficking/slavery victims around the world. **RAGAS can help connect you to existing projects and partnership opportunities.**

There are many organizations involved in ending human trafficking/modern slavery around the world. As you read about the many groups working in this space, consider what skills and resources your club has and needs to solve the problem. Many of the groups provided in the toolbox are already allied with individual Rotary clubs and there are Rotarians who can give you detailed information on the work they are doing. **RAGAS strongly recommends** *careful vetting of partners prior too engaging with them to ensure they are providing the services and results you seek*. We encourage Rotarians to contact RAGAS in order to be connected with a member who has experience with the kind of work your club wants to do.

The world can be filled with beauty and joy, but for some 40 million inhabitants, 70% of those being women and girls, it is filled with despair and enslavement. <u>Rotary Membership Country Numbers compared to TIP Report Rating & Global</u> <u>Slavery Index</u>

The tables in Appendix A provide the International Labour Organization & Minderoo (an NGO) estimated numbers in Modern Slavery and the Rotary Club and membership numbers, in those Countries. These along with the US Trafficking in Persons Country analysis reports and rating helps to pinpoint Countries where there are adequate Rotary resources to consider the need for and the potential for initiating Community Awareness and Prevention Education projects. There are approx. 20 Countries across Asia, Europe and South America (North America is in progress of tackling) where RAGAS and Rotarians could focus local community resources and projects to significantly impact Community Awareness and the global and local scale of HT / MS, through Education of current adolescents and thereby also influence future generations. The African continent and countries have limited Rotarians and resources and would require a special global project.

THE MORAL & LEGAL BASIS FOR CONDEMNING SLAVERY

It is appropriate for all to reflect on the moral & legal basis for a global campaign to eradicate HT / MS, which can be easily understood. Knowing how HT/MS is illegal, helps overcome potential pushback along the lines of "well it's their tradition out there" The modern, *global* expression of moral repugnance for, and *foundation of* the legal basis for slavery's illegality, can be found in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) made by the UN in 1948 – merely a declaration of course, but remarkably without a single dissenting vote.

UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS: TO BE ACHIEVED BY 2030

The World Heads of State, meeting at the United Nations Headquarters in New York from 25-27 September 2015 decided on new global Sustainable Development Goals with a number of targets. SDG 8.7

JOINT FAITHS DECLARATION

On 2nd December 2014 Catholic, Anglican, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, Jewish and Orthodox religious leaders signed a <u>Joint Declaration of Religious Leaders Against Modern Slavery</u> as a public statement of their commitment to work together in spiritual and practical action to eradicate this crime against humanity and restore dignity and freedom to its victims.

3Strands Global Foundation - is a national leader in the fight against human trafficking. Their mission is to prevent human trafficking through: **Education, Employment and Engagement**. 3Strands Global Foundation's PROTECT program was developed by survivor leaders and has continually been updated by survivors for the past 5 years. It is a four-pronged approach to human trafficking prevention education which includes; protocol design, evidenced based trauma-informed training for all staff, 5 different age appropriate K-12 curricula, and data reports on outcomes. PROTECT begins in kindergarten by establishing a foundation of trust and safety. It covers healthy relationships, online safety, consent, vulnerabilities, and risky behaviors. PROTECT strives to build resilience and create upstanders not bystanders. PROTECT is available in English and Spanish across the US and soon Australia. The PROTECT program is in alignment with all federal education standards and objectives and is a current subgrantee to four state Local Education Agencies (LEA's) who were awarded a grant from Health and Human Services Office of Trafficking In Persons. The Just Ask Prevention Curriculum was developed by a multidisciplinary team of experienced professionals and reaches over 250,000 students in El Salvador, Nigeria, and the US each year. This evidence-based curriculum is available in French, Spanish, Dutch and English and can be tailored to meet the unique needs of each community.

OTHER USA

Educators often have very specific expectations for their curriculum development, and it varies according to the age of the students and the type of educational institution involved. The curriculum goals may be focused on prevention, identification, intervention, or treatment. Generally, schools will want to be able to identify the reasons for the training, and then identify the curriculum goals and the content of the teaching. Several other US states have developed robust curricula, either independently focused on schools or jointly developed with other organizations. If the teachers don't want to reinvent the wheel in developing their own curricula, here are some suggestions from other US states:

D/ Student Lead Programs

Rotary places a great emphasis on encouraging service among youth. Developing youth leadership is key to continuing Rotary's service mission. In this section we are providing links to some youth organizations dedicated to combatting human trafficking.

Each Rotary club, which chooses to pair up with an NGO, should become familiar with the group through interaction and vetting. The toolbox provides links but does not vet.

Adolescents and college students have passion, are resourceful, and easily acquire new skills, particularly as technology changes rapidly; they can make excellent partners for Rotary Clubs.

Partners Against Child Trafficking – PACT. Students Against Child Trafficking (SACT - student branch)

The parent organization, PACT is an organization that is focused on prevention, in order to stop trafficking before it happens. PACT's mission can be summarized as NOT ONE MORE VICTIM. PACT is recognized as the educational platform for the Rotary Club to End Human Trafficking (RCEHT) an international club, to further the mission to end human trafficking across the globe. <u>https://www.pact.city/</u>

SACT - Student members are a motivated community of students around the world who are joined together with the mission of protecting themselves and their peers from the dangers of child sex trafficking. SACT offers an online training course for students ages 13 to 18 (English & Spanish) to learn how to recognize signs and signals of child trafficking. The course is about PREVENTION. Students learn how to spot trafficking signs and stop it before anything can happen. There is a school ambassador program along with school sponsorship opportunities.

The mission is to empower students through peer-to-peer communications to detect, defend and disrupt against predators in their own environment and bring awareness to adults to stop the demand.

Our Future of Change (OFOC), (youth arm of Her Future Coalition)

Our Future of Change is the global, youth-led chapter of Her Future Coalition: an organization providing rehabilitation, education, and employment programs for trafficking survivors and at-risk girls and women, primarily in India and Nepal. As the youth-chapter of this organization, Our Future of Change aims to provide students globally (ages 13-22) with resources to get involved in the fight against human trafficking. Since initiation in May 2020, Our Future of Change has recruited a team of over 300 ambassadors in 30 countries who are actively working to raise awareness in their communities about trafficking and contribute to solutions.



Events held by OFOC have included a virtual race, t-shirt sales, a Dare Event (challenge based fundraiser), Coding Seminar (coding webpages on trafficking), a virtual art show, and webinars on trafficking topics.

After joining Our Future of Change as an ambassador, students can join one of the volunteer committees or start a club in their school or community. They have a news committee, design committee, event planning committee, and outreach committees: all of which play a significant role in helping Our Future of Change spread awareness about modern slavery and team with Her Future Coalition to provide counseling, shelter, education, financial literacy and training services to trafficking survivors and at-risk women and children.

R C Montivideo (Uruguay) D 4975 "Uruguay slavery prevention education project"

On the occasion of their centenary held in 2018, R C Montevideo after discussions with Rotary Peace Fellows decided to initiate a project focusing on slavery prevention through education for teenagers, sexual and labor exploitation and trafficking. The project was co-funded by the Rotary Club Buenos Aires Argentina, a Global grant from the Rotary Foundation and contribution from the District of Río de Janeiro (Brazil).

The syllabus was prepared from 2016 with assistance of two Rotary Peace Fellows from their experience in Thailand. The training consisted of a 3 day course (16 hrs), for teachers , sport trainers, leaders of teenager groups, social assistants and other people coming from different professions, enhanced by police and Rotarian participation. These leaders could then conduct / explain to teenagers how the trafficking networks operate, in order to teach them how to avoid being trafficked and exploited.

They use some short films of 20 to 30 minutes, in order to have a more reallistic experience.



The locations chosen for the project were largely spread over the country in different zones, half of them near Uruguayan's borders, where the problem of Modern Slavery/Human Trafficking is most prevalent . Uruguay is a country of origin, transit and destiny for Human Trafficking. Support was also received from the Women Institute, part of the Social Development Ministry.

The initiative was taken up by the Women Freemasons in Uruguay who ran a separate project.

Rotary District 5710 is a leader with a district committee dedicated to human trafficking along with a cause club, Rotary Club of Community Action Against Human Trafficking (CAAHT) committed to only human trafficking discussions, presenters, projects and experts. The District has received 3 Global grants along with District grants with a focus on Education and human trafficking.

Rotary Swarm to Counter Human Trafficking global grant convenes local service providers, law enforcement, healthcare workers, and other community leaders in Lenexa and Leawood, Kansas to equip them with the skills to identify human trafficking systems in their community and develop networks, techniques, and collaborations to counterattack these trafficking systems. Rotarians are working with Lucy Bloom, Veronica's Voice, and Ashley Chapman, Justice U and Engage Together, to implement this education and collaboration project. Rotary Human Trafficking and Domestic Violence Drop-In Center global grant in Topeka, KS established a site with services to support victims' psychosocial needs and assist with basic needs of food, rest, laundry, clothing, and shower facilities in a safe environment. The center is an entry point for longer-term community support services. The "Day Center" as it is known, was established in 2019 and is providing services to 25-30 victims per month. YWCA of Northeast Kansas Center for Safety and Empowerment is the collaborating partner on this project.

Reintegration of Survivors of Sexual Exploitation and Trafficking global grant in collaboration with Rended Heart and several international and local Rotary clubs has been has been instrumental in the opening of The Ready Training Center and Chosen, A Rended Heart Boutique. The Ready Training Center provides resources and assistance needed to support survivors on their path to sustainable employment. The boutique sells high-end clothing donated by Rotarians. Survivors will have on-the -job training in retail sales, marketing, financial management, inventory, customer service, and business management. Here is a short video of the organization learning about human trafficking and shopping at the boutique all proceeds from sales go to support survivors.

District 5300 US. India. Piyali Junction Learning Centres transforming the lives of girls and young women. Recognizing that education is the most powerful tool in the prevention of human trafficking – Piyali provides young



women with the tools they need to protect themselves, stand up against domestic violence, and delay the possibility of becoming a child bride. These funds will be used to sponsor young girls / women.

District 5240 US. R C Santa Maria Breakfast. 2019-2021 Several projects. Support to CASA of HOPE for Women Victimized by Sex Trafficking. Funds are used for rehabilitation, skill development and focusing on next steps.

District 5495 US. R C Verrado Buckeye. 2002-21. Provide support for an Educational Child Prevention Trafficking Program for West Valley of Maricopa County.

District 5100 Canada. R C Greater Clarke County. 2018-19 Support training, outreach, and information about sex trafficking.

District 5110 US. R C Sisters 2017-18 Purchase 100,000 stickers with contact Information for the Human Trafficking Hotline. The stickers will be placed in envelopes in women's restrooms in Liquor licensed establishments around the state of Oregon.

District 5030 US. R C Seattle 2018-19 Support activities to train and establish protocols for health care professionals to assist in the identification and support of of youth exploited in human trafficking.

District 5160 US R C Brentwood 2021-22. The plan of this project is to provide equipment, resources and training to allow Pillars of Hope to educate the community in the greater East Contra Costa County area on human trafficking. Ultimately, the goal is to prevent human trafficking by identifying the vulnerable in our community. With these resources, Pillars of Hope will be able to reach more people who can prevent and stop this crime.

District 5360 US R C Lacombe 2017-18 Thailand. To provide youth rescued from human trafficking with a Tilapia pond system. The pond will provide them with a sustainable source of fish, opportunity to learn new skills and create a small scale enterprise.

District 5050 US R C Coquitlam Sunrise 2018-19 Education and coordinated response to violence that are exposed to Human Trafficking/Child Sexual Exploitation in the community.

District 5010 US R C Anchorage East 2018 -21 Several projects, support for survivors, Face of Justice program support with laptops and cyber security identifying and working with children at high risk, rescuing trafficked youth.

District 5650 US. 2017-18 Women empowerment Activities including Human Trafficking, creating coalition, raising awareness by purchasing billboards and marketing materials, assisting with website development.

District 5650 US Omaha Suburban 2018-19. Hotel/Motel Anti-Trafficking Training for workers; brochures, binders, video production, plaques for hotels/motels, cost of training sessions.

District 5650 US R C Council Bluffs Centennial 2018-19 Design and build Website, Facebook, billboards to help promote the resources; ads in the local papers to promote Human Trafficking Awareness Month; promote the conference March of 2019, speaker honorarium, electronic marketing and resource materials

District 5710 US. R C Community Action Against Human Trafficking 2020-21 Education Initiatives.



- In April 2021 CAAHT held a virtual Human Trafficking Summit: Educators Role in Preventing Human <u>Trafficking</u>. Ashlie Bryant founder of 3Strands Foundation along with other panelists discussing curriculum, educations efforts, certification for educators and other resources for community members, teachers, and educators to take part in preventing human trafficking.

- Students Stop Traffic - Rotary clubs have partnered with local organizations Intouch Group and Lumen Touch to spread awareness about child trafficking. Together, the organizations have launched a contest, <u>Student Stop Traffic</u>, which aims to inspire Kansas City-area high school students to create a compelling awareness campaign or idea to combat the trafficking and targeting of peers in their own communities. Ideas include an advertising campaign, a live event, a social media campaign, or something more.

District 5950 US 2017-18. Collaborate with an organization to create a matching project to support education of Human Trafficking awareness during the 2018 Superbowl in Minneapolis.

District 5950 US R C Minneapolis City of Lakes 2018-19 Conduct a half-day seminar for Minneapolis community leaders on human trafficking to increase awareness and provide dialogue for future prevention.

District 5960 US R C Arden Hills / Shoreview 2020-21 An overarching project that addresses Human Trafficking & Healthy Youth - focus areas education.

District 6110 US. R C Pittsburgh Sunrise 2018-19 A local coalition is working in Pittsburgh to conduct a conference in September of 2018 that will inform health care providers and professionals, law enforcement agencies and behavioural health and pastoral care personnel how to recognize situations involving H T and how to respond.

District 6450 US. R C Matteson 2018-19. Interact Youth Peace Summit. Matteson Rotary Interact is holding a Peace Summit for students and parents. The summit will address human trafficking, drug abuse/addiction, gun violence and domestic violence. Partners include Family Youth Initiatives, Dreamcatcher Foundation, LaRabida Children's Hospital, Woodridge Intervention & Stop Violence Now.

This will increase an awareness of this problem especially for the youth who are targeted. Rotarians are recruiting the speakers, securing the venue, preparing informational posters and advertising for the program.

District 7890 US. R C Newington 2020-21 Public outreach & awareness of human trafficking.

District 7610 US. R C West Springfield 2017-18 Provide awareness education to students and their communities about the realities and threat of human trafficking by developing and delivering educational materials in interactive and engaging formats. The project will reach approximately 10,000 people in the Northern Virginia community and will aid in the prevention of human trafficking which is afflicting our teen and young adult population.



District 7610 US. R C 7610 R C Ashburn 2018-19. South America & Africa. Foster initiatives supporting the Free the Girls Foundation which rescues victims of human trafficking in El Salvador, Uganda and Mozambique. The club anticipates helping educate the community of the dangers of human trafficking.

District 7610 US. R C Gainesville-Haymarket 2019-20 Objective is to bring awareness about the human trafficking issue in area via "community conversations" with the public, survivors of trafficking, the schools and law enforcement. Host a series of events to get community involved.

District 7600 US. R C Hampton Roads (Norfolk) 2018-19. In Partnership with Samaritan House and Zonta, the RCHR funding support to improve a "safe house" in Virginia Beach for victims of human trafficking.

District 7360 US. R C Matinsburg 2017-18. An anti Human Trafficking, Awareness and training grant towards education.

District 7680 US. R C Charlotte-International 2020-21. Provides support for victims of human trafficking through trauma-informed curriculum, knowledgeable case workers, a network of community members/Rotarians, a structured schedule, and reclamation resources that empower the victim educationally, emotionally, and physically.

District 7750 US. R C Greenville City Centre 2021-22. SWITCH is an organization that has engaged in a multi-pronged approach to end human trafficking and sex exploitation in the 10 upstate counties. Many of the approaches involved classroom training and these funds will be used to renovate classrooms to include replacing flooring, repainting walls and replacing furniture. 75 individuals will benefit and 12 Rotarians are involved.

District 6920 US. R C Brookhaven (Atlanta) 2017 -18. Help HavenATL, the Salvation Army's facility in south Atlanta assisting women caught in human trafficking. This project will design and implement a new virtual mentoring program helping HavenATL graduates (women who have completed a series of classes and met certain goals at HavenATL) transition to a healthy and useful life beyond their past life of sexual exploitation.

District 6920 US. R C Augusta 2017-18 Combat human trafficking by enhancing the awareness of this human injustice. Purchase and distribute educational materials and potentially purchase equipment to support law enforcement efforts.

THE MORAL & LEGAL BASIS FOR CONDEMNING SLAVERY

Extract from RAGAS Ambassador's Speakers Toolbox

Before looking at the sources of information about HT/MS it may be useful to reflect on the moral & legal basis for our campaign to eradicate slavery. Armed with this knowledge you can respond, with authority to anyone who counters you. The moral and religious bases are easily understood. It along with knowing how HT/MS is illegal, helps overcome any audience pushback along the lines of "well it's their tradition out there".

7.1 THE MORAL BASIS FOR CONDEMNING SLAVERY: UDHR

The modern, global expression of moral repugnance for, and foundation of the legal basis for

slavery's illegality, can be found in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) made by

the UN in 1948 – merely a declaration of course, but remarkably without a single dissenting vote.

Article 1. All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Article 2. Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind...

Article 3. Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 4. No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

The remaining 26 Articles outlaw torture and declare the other rights that have like the right to life, and slavery, now become enshrined in international law, <u>through a body of treaties and conventions</u>.

Note the order in which slavery appears in the Declaration: immediately after the right to life. So unlike the position 200 years ago campaigning against slavery is not attempting to impose on others, an opinion thought by some, to be radical, so it's not "political" or disputed policy. You'll never see a manifesto in favour of slavery. We are merely trying to ensure that the law is obeyed.

7.2 UNITED NATION'S SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS: TO BE ACHIEVED BY 2030



The World Heads of State, meeting at the United Nations Headquarters in New York from 25-27 September 2015 decided on new global Sustainable Development Goals with a number of achievable targets.

> Target 8.7: "Take immediate and effective measures to eradicate forced labour, end modern slavery and human trafficking and secure the prohibition and elimination of the worst forms of child labour, including recruitment and use of child soldiers, and by 2025 end child labour in all its form."

> > 7.3 JOINT FAITHS DECLARATION ON SLAVERY

On 2nd December 2014 Catholic, Anglican, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, Jewish and Orthodox religious leaders signed a Joint Declaration of Religious Leaders Against Modern Slavery as a public statement of their commitment to work together in spiritual and practical action to eradicate this crime against humanity and restore dignity and freedom to its victims.

Declaration extracts:-

"The leaders of the worlds great global faiths have just come together in Vatican City to clarify any perceived ambiguity in holy texts and achieve a public proclamation condemning slavery for all the time. They have agreed and essential truth that all people are valued equally by God."

"Modern slavery is hidden in places of prostitution, in factories and farms, and fishing boats, illegal sweatshops, private homes, behind locked doors and in a myriad of other places. It exists in cities, villages and communities in every country in the world rich or poor. This complex criminal activity crosses borders and challenges society at every level, cunningly invading judicial and civil controls. In order for it to end, urgent and coordinated global action is needed."

"The moral political and economic impacts of modern slavery pervade and harm our societies and peoples. Eradication of this evil requires the united effort, coordination and resources of all sovereign, corporate, faith and civil leaders." "Modern Slavery is a crime against humanity."

"We pledge ourselves here today to do all in our power within our faith communities and beyond, to work together for the freedom of all those who are in slaved and traffic so that their future may be restored. Today we have the opportunity, awareness, wisdom, innovation and technology to achieve this human and moral imperative."

7.4 THE LEGAL FRAMEWORK AGAINST SLAVERY



• The Supplementary Convention on the Abolition of Slavery, the Slave Trade, and Institutions and Practices Similar to Slavery 1956, and the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights 1966 (ICCPR) both outlaw HT/MS.

Most countries are parties to these Conventions, and thus, in customary international law, it is applicable to, and in, <u>all</u> countries. Surprisingly perhaps, not every country has criminalised HT/MS in their own domestic (national) laws.

94 states appear not to have such legislation. Such laws began to appear in the very early 19c (Denmark) and the process gradually continues through to the early part the 21c (Chad 2017).

To clarify this, generally, it is not unusual for international law and domestic laws to conflict. For example in some countries domestic law permits:-

- capital punishment for: minors (Egypt, Iran), or say embezzlement (China)
- lengthy imprisonment for insulting the head of state (e.g. SaudiArabia).

However such executions or imprisonment are illegal under International Law. So it occasionally is with

slavery. A country hasn't banned slavery but it is illegal under customary international law. Most

importantly therefore remember, under international law, HT/MS is illegal everywhere.

13th Amendment to the US Constitution: abolition of Slavery

Passed by the US Congress on January 31, 1865, and ratified on December 6, 1865, the 13th amendment abolished slavery in the United States and provides that

"Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.".

Other domestic legislation

Wherever you live it's worth being aware of you own "domestic" legislation: your own country's statutes: just an *outline understanding* of their provisions. You can find overviews online. There are in the 21c some powerful pieces of legislation, especially relevant to businesses, e.g.:-

Appendix D – Playbook for Community Awareness Campaign by a Rotary Club

SCOPE:

Local Rotary clubs partner with other anti-trafficking stakeholders through a "hub and spoke" model to perform a community situational assessment and create an action plan to combat trafficking/slavery using Community Awareness & Prevention Education as the first step in the battle against human trafficking/modern slavery. Hub – Rotary

Spokes – Stakeholders

Tread – Community (where the rubber meets the road)

PRE-WORK & PLANNING

OBJECTIVE: To engage club in community partnership to serve as the "hub" in a "hub and spoke" model Step 1. Gain club buy-in

- Invite relevant speakers to increase awareness of situation on local and global problem
 - Governmental Agencies:
 - Department of Social Services
 - Local Law Enforcement
 - Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO's) focused on the problem such as:
 - Rotary Action Group Against Slavery Coordinator or Ambassador for your area
 - Local anti-trafficking and/or survivor services programs
 - o Survivors
 - Work with local programs to identify survivors who are willing and able to share their story
- Work with club to identify and engage local stakeholders (example stakeholder list below)

Step 2. Identify and gain buy-in from key (non-Rotarian) partner to serve as Community Co-chair or Champion so it is bigger than a Rotary project

• For example, in the United States, the Rotary Club of Warrenton, Virginia (District 7610) partnered with their county Sheriff, Bob Mosier, who worked with International Justice Mission specifically on Human and Sex



Trafficking in SE Asia and was an ideal partner and champion as he had first-hand knowledge to share and the credibility to lend to the project in the community.

Step 3. Identify Stakeholders

• Create spreadsheet with contact information and category type (Law Enforcement, Survivor Services, Media, Education, Community Member, etc.) to be easily searchable when you need it.

PHASE 1: RAISE AWARENESS THROUGH COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS:

OBJECTIVE: To engage the community and raise public awareness of human trafficking/modern slavery at a local level opening the conversation, using a common language and provide possible solutions to safeguard their community such as prevention education in the schools and community training.

- Schedule multiple Community Conversations starting in the local Middle Schools
 - Reasoning is the average age a minor will be approached by a potential trafficker is 12 years old, this is where they are at age 12
 - Middle schools also usually have smaller auditoriums so it looks more full than the same number in a large auditorium
 - Engaging the schools in the process gets their buy-in early and helps set the stage for curriculum in schools later
- Provide space for informational booths from Stakeholders to provide additional local resources and information beyond what was shared from the podium
- Plan Speaker Line-up. The purpose is to raise awareness around a very alarming topic. The natural instinct is fight or flight, so plan to go easy on the audience. No more than 1.5 to 2 hours, including Q&A, or you will likely lose your audience. Provide solutions so the audience can get engaged and not leave feeling helpless.
 - Example Speaker Line-up
 - Welcome by hosting school principal (or someone connected to the school)
 - Rotary Club chair acts as emcee to keep things moving and introduces, gently wraps-up who may exceed time, etc.
 - Local law enforcement perspective of local human trafficking/modern slavery situation
 - Federal or Regional Law Enforcement agent to share regional and/or local cases and perspective (videos of newsreels helps make it real as the audience may be familiar with the cases)
 - Survivor or survivor's family member provide their story to "humanize it" and provide a concrete example
 - Education based solution (ideally the eventual curriculum partner who will provide curriculum in schools, or is very familiar with the proposed curriculum to build community support early)
 - Survivor services solution to provide hope for attendees (local victim/survivor advocacy/support group)
 - Questions & Answers attendees will time need to process what they just heard, so allow lots of time for Q&A
 - Wrap-up from Rotary emcee with call to action to include:
 - Follow Facebook Group to share information
 - Request audience write Letters to the Editor about trafficking and the event to encourage attendance at future ones



- Volunteer opportunities (handing out posters, inviting people to the next Community Conversation)
- Hang restroom posters to raise awareness and help potential victims access assistance
- Education opportunities
- Ask them to invite your club to other speaking opportunities (churches, businesses, etc.)
- Audience will want to help give them concrete avenues to engage locally
- Marketing/Advertising
 - Create a Facebook or other social media page as the "Hub" to share local/regional HT information
 - Use Facebook Live to live stream one of the conversations for those who couldn't attend, and/or for promotional purposes
 - If possible, have one of them professionally filmed and edited and pin it on the FB page
 - Create the event invitation in the FB page to invite to the event.
 - Add co-hosts such as stakeholders/partners/speakers, Rotary club etc.
 - Encourage everyone to share and invite attendees
 - Leverage local media (Newspaper, radio, magazine, television, online, etc.)
 - Write Press Releases/Media Advisories with pictures if available to make it easy for media outlets to
 - Put event in community calendars
 - Write preview stories
 - Write wrap-up stories after the event
 - Create simple posters that can be easily emailed and printed by citizens who will help post (request Rotarian and community help through the FB page)
 - Send Letters to the Editor for a few weeks before the event as well as share at local community/business events to let them know it is coming

PHASE 1.5: STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS (AT THE SAME TIME AS COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS)

- Rotary Club members ("hub") leverage their influence to invite all identified stakeholders ("spokes") to meetings:
 - Rotarian to facilitate meetings as the "hub"
 - Have Rotary members serve as scribes and note takers facilitators can't do both and attendees won't take as good of notes as someone who's sole job is to do it (bring note pads, pens, flip charts, markers and easel)
 - Provide nametags and tent cards if possible (bring materials and markers)
 - \circ $\;$ Invite media to attend and cover all of the meetings to keep community awareness high
 - Meetings can be as frequent as needed for each community, but at least quarterly is recommended to keep momentum
 - Always plan to send an agenda in advance and minutes at the end along with a contact list to all attendees so they have record to refer to
- <u>First meeting</u>: Is a Meet & Greet to introduce the organizations, and what they specifically do in the Human Trafficking/Modern Slavery area and network the organizations
 - Introduce stakeholders many won't know each other
 - Determine who is doing what look for overlap (thus partnership opportunities)
 - Identify gaps in services (such as education, awareness, affordable housing, transportation, etc.) don't solve them yet as this meeting is a comradery building meeting – the gaps will identify who is missing from the stakeholder meeting for next time.
 - Ask at each meeting "who is not here who should be?", and invite to the next meeting



- At the end, ask who is missing that needs to be involved? Get their contact info and invite them!
- <u>Second meeting</u>: Introduce again and start Community Assessment focused on Community Awareness and prevention needs:
 - What are the gaps in services that need to be filled from their perspective?
 - Does anyone already fill them?
 - If not, who should?
 - What could that look like?
 - At the end, ask who is missing that needs to be involved? Get their contact info and invite them!
- <u>Third meeting</u>: Break in to service areas such as first responders, education, survivor services, service organizations, NGOs, etc., depending on attendees.
 - Have them introduce themselves and then pose a question or two that they can discuss such as:
 - What Gaps do you see that hinder your ability to provide the necessary services to prevent human trafficking?
 - What/Who could fill those gaps?
 - At the end, ask who is missing that needs to be involved? Get their contact info and invite them!
- <u>Fourth Meeting</u>: Action Plan can now start based on what you have gathered from the first three meetings break into committees to solve the identified problems!
 - Committees can be broken by type of problem, service sector, etc. Don't over think it, let the group of smart, capable professionals dig in and get going.
 - Your job as facilitator is to be sure each committee has a lead and focus. Have them develop an action plan around solving their project during the first half of the meeting -
 - The second half of the meeting is for each committee to report out their solution to the problem they were working on.
 - Open it for discussion and ideas
 - Assign each group to continue working on it and send a developed action plan at least 1 week before the next meeting so the facilitator can compile them for everyone to read.
- <u>Fifth Meeting and beyond:</u> Continue working through the action plans, reporting back to the Rotary Club Board with any needs Rotary can step in to fill. This is a community problem that the community can solve as long as the hub and spokes are working together!

PHASE 2: PREVENTION EDUCATION CURRICULUM IN SCHOOLS:

OBJECTIVE: To have one consistent curriculum in all schools in locality so all students are educated and safeguarded equally.

- This will also reduce the potential expense without additional customization by provider.
- Recommendation is to vet the provider and their curriculum's effectiveness in reaching students in a language they will understand and be compelled to engage
- Recommend curriculum be delivered by a regular teacher as it proves more effective than a one-off guest speaker and/or video which only allows for those in attendance that one day to hear and because the content can be startling, often block-out in fight or flight reaction



- A regular teacher is also with the students for the entire semester and in the school, so they are more likely to cue in to signs of trafficking and will have a relationship to address the student if suspected as a possible victim
- Hold an "Education Summit" inviting all public, private schools and higher education (university and/or community college) in the locality to meet preferred provider, review curriculum, discuss roadblocks and how to overcome them
 - Perceived roadblocks will likely be:
 - <u>District Time</u> Make it easy on the schools, stakeholders can do their homework and recommend a specific curriculum to take the pressure off of the schools (RAGAS endorses training and curriculum criteria aligned with the United States Department of Health & Human Services Human Trafficking Youth Prevention Education (HTYPE) as outlined below in the Prevention Education Toolbox, also in the Toolbox is a list of vetted providers to assist clubs in selecting a partner):
 - <u>Classroom Time</u> recommend partnering with an educational curriculum that ties directly to one or more educational standards so it finds a place in the school (typically in Health, Social Sciences or Family Life Education)
 - <u>Financial</u> offer for the Club to partner with schools and curriculum provider to write grants and/or fundraise to cover the cost
 - <u>Age Appropriateness</u> some schools are concerned about teaching this anti-trafficking content to younger students; however data shows that the average age of a trafficker approaching a potential victim is 12 years old. That means traffickers are approaching much younger students, as well as older students to get to that average. The earlier it is addressed, the more protected your community will be. Age appropriate curriculum which addresses some of the periphery issues that surround trafficking such as bullying, healthy relationships, mental health, appropriate online contact, drug abuse and more starting in elementary school gives the building blocks necessary to protect communities.
 - <u>Perceived Parental Pushback</u> gain parental buy-in with a second round of Community Conversations with an invitation from the Principal and PTA/PTO to attend and gain an understanding of how vulnerable students are and how to protect them through education
 - Use stakeholder and Rotary influence in the community with media and personal conversations to build consensus and community support for curriculum
 - Access the Human Trafficking/ Modern Slavery Prevention Education Toolbox for curriculum vetting criteria and a list of vetted partners.

PHASE 2.5 – COMMUNITY EDUCATION/PARTNERSHIPS:

OBJECTIVE: To safeguard the community by increasing industry specific training leveraging NGO partnerships to provide the training and education for each group so their entire staff is trained.

- Educate community members through one-day identification and response training (could be offered multiple times throughout the community).
 - Health care (ER, mental health providers, pregnancy centers, OB/GYN, addiction centers)
 - o Fire & Rescue
 - Law Enforcement
 - Prosecutor's office
 - Department of Social Services
 - Places of worship
 - NGOs and community with youth in their mission such as youth service organizations, sports leagues, etc.
 - Hotel/motel staff
 - Trades industries (plumbing, electrical, cabling, heating/air-conditioning, etc.)



- Transportation (Bus, Train, Airports, Ferry, Shipping Port, etc.)
- Create "Safe Zones" where youth can get help free of judgment with confidence that employees/staff within those facilities will understand what they are talking about and know how to quickly get help.
 - o Hospitals
 - o Schools
 - Recreational centers
 - o Community centers
 - Places of worship
 - Fire departments
 - o Hotels
 - Malls/Shopping Centers
 - Transportation Hubs
- Rotary Clubs can write grants and fundraise to cover the costs of these types of trainings if there is a shortfall
