The RAGAS Board sent out a Request for Proposal for clubs and districts to propose Community Awareness & Prevention Education grants throughout our membership and accepted and funded six (7) grants at \$1,000USD each. These grant funds were matching funds to combine with additional funds from the club or District. The purpose of the grants were to beta test the CAPE plan so the board could adjust it as needed. The Grant Review Committee reviewed and selected grants which represented clubs, districts and

grants which represented clubs, districts and countries around the globe in order to collect a broader dataset. The grants are to be completed on or before 31 March 2023 so data may be tabulated and presented at our annual meeting in June 2023. RAGAS plans on continuing issuing RFP's for education/prevention FYI 2022-2023 Applications Approved: 1/ District 6900, R C North Cobb County US. Project partnership with Rescuing Hope to enlighten the public about sex trafficking so as to educate potential victims, first responders and empower advocates. Rescuing Hope to provide Speakers, brochures and information to Rotary Clubs in Districts 6900, 6910 and 6920 and member business associations. Budget \$4500-. 2/ District 4975 Montevideo, Uruguay. The Project is to create and publish an information memorandum of the recent successful awareness and education project. It is to support training high school teachers so they can replicate the course contents for students. The published memorandum will be shared with other Rotary clubs, civil society, police, military, immigration and educational institutions, to assist and support wide community issues awareness. Budget \$1000- 3/ District 9800 R C Brighton North, for NGO Chab Dai Cambodia and CEO Helen Sworn, member R C Ending Human Trafficking D5950. The project is support for the Asia Regional Anti Trafficking (ARAT) Conference, now webinar 19-20 July. The Conference organised by Chab Dai is the largest anti trafficking conference in Asia and has been conducted annually since 2017, with 400+ attendees from 27 Countries in 2021. The topic of Community Awareness and Prevention Education will be part of the 2022 program, which will be promoted with RAGAS as a supporter to Asian Rotary Districts and Clubs. Conference budget US \$ 16185-. 4/ District 6000 IOWA. The project led by the District Governor is currently via 17 Rotary clubs with plans to undertake local anti-trafficking prevention initiatives. Each club have awareness and prevention plans – including Community NGO panel awareness and prevention presentations, rescue service stickers, promotions to business leaders to create trafficking free zones. The goal is to arm and protect primarily youth from all forms of trafficking and exploitation. The Clubs with partner with local nonprofits and schools to initiate prevention education programs. Budget \$5500- 5/ District 7950 R C Falmouth Cape Cod. The project is to help with books for a school library – Hasta Memorial School in a remote village in Nepal. The school was founded because in that village human trafficking to India is an accepted way of life, with few alternatives. Education is essential for opportunity and choice and the books with topics of body safety, consent, respectful relationships, self-esteem, gender

respectful relationships, self-esteem, gender equality and human rights will be provided with partner organization Her Future Coalition. The project is aimed for expansion and is being promoted to other Rotary Clubs in the District for further support. 6/ Missing Link Trust - India is one of the leading Organizations working to prevent sex trafficking through awareness and education. MISSING Link Trust focuses on Prevention through partnerships to the public through their Education and Empower programs. Under their education pillar, they use power of technology to create impactful resources and content to educate the masses on abuse and exploitation. Their resources are a combination of innovation education programs, immersive art, and storytelling platforms using the power of technology do good at scale. The Missing Awareness and safety School program (MASSp) is a first- of- its- kind program that is designed to address the personal safety and empowerment needs of adolescents. The core focus of the program is to prevent sex abuse, exploitation and trafficking through innovative digital teaching and learning methods. It uses compelling narrative, art, games and technology for an immersive experiential learning. Though MASSp can be implemented via online and WhatsApp, in 24 South Parganas. Project description	<p>This Project had 10,000 pro-bono legal hours at a value of \$2.5 million US dollars. While diverse collections of human trafficking laws on specialized issues or for particular jurisdictions exist, this compendium seeks to provide the first single standardized summaries of the laws in this critical field. The law firm of Jones Day partnered with the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery and various corporations to produce this Global Compendium—Human Trafficking Laws. The Global Compendium—Human Trafficking Laws project seeks to create a global compendium that would make available the first single standardized summaries of human trafficking and modern slavery laws of each country and all U.S. states and territories. The intended users of this Compendium include governments, legislators, NGOs, companies, victims, victim advocates, academics, attorneys, and others. The information in the Compendium not only summarizes laws and identifies resources but also provides that information in a standardized format. This standardization should facilitate use of compendium information and permit users to easily compare the laws of different countries on the same topic. For example, a country’s human trafficking laws on supply chain reporting are in Section 4 for each country chapter. Some country chapters also contain custom sections addressing specific additional information. The law firm of Jones Day partnered with the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery and various corporations to produce this Compendium. The initial installment of the compendium contains about 90 separate pdfs of the human trafficking laws in various countries/states/territories. To summarize each country’s human trafficking laws is a substantial undertaking especially as laws change from time to time. Rather than delay availability of this information, it was decided to release portions of the Compendium in installments. In the future, additional country chapters will be added and existing chapters updated.</p>

A21's Primary Prevention Program (PPP) is aimed at helping to raise awareness and protect young children from becoming victims and help stop exploitation that results from sexual exploitation, labour trafficking and on line cyber exploitation in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria. The PPP is a three-session program contextualised for the Australian Primary School Standards, that aims to teach children ages 6 - 12 how they can protect themselves and others through play-based activities. It is designed to empower children, to champion their young voices and equip them to make informed decisions to protect themselves and others. The content focuses on value and child rights, safe and unsafe migration and human trafficking. The aim of this particular part of the project is to support the development, promotion and distribution of the newly developed program and its accompanying resources to educators across Australia and provide training on the program to facilitators.
